## Menominee Fight For Everyone's Water

The Menominee recently sponsored an event at College of Menominee Nation called Save the Menominee River Speaking Tour. Chairman Gary Besaw talked about comparing the mouth of the Menominee River (a sacred place) to the monuments in Washington D.C. or to Arlington Cemetery. And he bid the question, would you have an open sulfide mine there?

Professor Al Gedicks, Department of sociology from the university of Wisconsin-Lacrosse, speaking on open pit mining said, "The people in Marinette County have expressed their dissatisfaction with the state of Wisconsin's noninvolvement in this project. They have passed a resolution 18 to 0 of the County Board, unanimously opposing this mine project and saying that the state of Wisconsin ought to be protecting as opposed to colluding with the mining company and

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# Following is the Ordinance governing the Many Trails Park and Camping From Chapter 16 – Public Peace and Good Order Ordinance

## Section 16.21 Park Rules

(A) Regular Park Rules. All persons using the tribal park facilities shall abide by the following special terms and conditions:

(1) Camping is permitted in designated camping areas only.

(2) No fires are permitted except in designated campfire areas. Only firewood that was gathered from within the geographic boundaries of the townships of Bartelme or Red Springs may be used for campfires.

(3) There shall be no littering of any kind inside park boundaries. Garbage and recycling containers shall be used, as appropriate, to dispose of waste materials. If no garbage or recycling container is provided, then waste materials must be packed out.

(4) Defacing of any park property or vegetation is strictly prohibited.

(5) The maximum speed limit on park and campground roads is 15 m.p.h.

(6) Through traffic is prohibited on the campground road when the Pow Wow or other tribal functions are scheduled in the park area.

(7) Fishing (by tribal member or those with required permits) in the river is prohibited in designated swimming areas, when swimmers are present.

(8) Excessive noise is prohibited.

(9) Campers shall observe established campground rules.

(10) No alcohol shall be allowed in any tribal parks from the hour of 10 p.m. until the hour of 10 a.m.

(11) After 8 p.m., no minors are allowed except if accompanied by a responsible adult, such as a parent or guardian.

(12) Fireworks are not permitted.

(13) Any visibly intoxicated, boisterous, or discourteous person(s) will be subject to immediate removal in addition to any other penalties.

(14) There shall be no parking in private driveways without the land assignee's permission.

(15) No weapons or firearms are permitted at any time, other than those carried by official law enforcement personnel.

(16) Camping is by permit only.

(a) Permits are available to Tribal members from the Property and Equipment Department, Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and shall be available online at the Tribe's website.

(b) Tribal Members and their family and/or guests may camp.

(c) All campers must abide by all Tribal rules and regulations.

(d) If the camper will utilize electricity, a \$3.00 charge per night must be paid prior to permit being issued.

(e) Permits are subject to revocation if rules and regulations are violated and the applicant may be barred from applying for camping permits in the future.

(17) Use of the park, including the campground, by others may be granted by Tribal Council upon such terms and conditions as the Tribal Council shall deem appropriate.

## (B) Additional Rules for Pow Wow Weekend and Other Special Tribal Events.

During the annual Pow Wow weekend and five (5) days before and after Pow Wow weekend, and other special Tribal events that may arise, the following additional rules apply:

(1) Stockbridge-Munsee Police Department shall coordinate overall security at the event(s). The Police Department will work with the event's organizers to identify security needs and security personnel that the organizers need to provide.

**(2) No alcohol is allowed in the entire park, including the campground, at any time.**

(3) Quiet time shall be from 8 p.m. to 10 a.m.

(4) Camping, parking, and vending shall only be in designated areas.

**(5) No pets or other animals are permitted at any time, other than service animals.**

(C) Penalties and Enforcement. In addition to any other penalty, including criminal charges:

(1) Citations against minors may also be issued against the parent(s) or guardian of the minor.

(2) Violators are subject to immediate removal and eviction from the event and are subject to being banned for up to 12 months.

(3) Vehicles may be towed from the park at the owner's expense.

(4) Alcohol, fireworks, weapons, firearms or other dangerous or illegal items are subject to confiscation.

Please contact the clinic if you would like to see a different program in place so you can safely dispose of unwanted meds.

Please contact Seralee Azzolina if you have comments or would like to see a different program put in place.

There is a different program available but it will be over \$1,000 annually.

If there is a lot of response maybe the clinic could look at instituting a replacement program sooner rather than later.

jeopardizing the clean water that comes from the Menominee river which supplies drinking water for the people in Marinette county and eventually ends up in lake Michigan." Gedicks added, "What we must understand about this mining project is it's not a series of technical decisions. What is going on here is not a mining project, it's a toxic waste project and it's excluded both the Menominee tribe, as well as the public, from any kind of meaningful participation in this process and therefore it has been ongoing resistance on every level."

Menominee attorney Starlyn Tourtilott was at the event and reported that the Menominee river just got named the tenth most endangered river in the United States. Tourtilott said, "We have filed a contested case hearing regarding the mining permit. We have hired two attorneys, one from Michigan and another out of the District of Columbia. Another individual land owner, Tom Warner, has also filed a case. And a motion to intervene has been filed and granted."

To address the history and background issues the following information has been taken extensively from <http://www.noback40.org>: The Back Forty Mine project is a proposed open pit metallic sulfide mine located on the banks of the Menominee River in Lake Township, Michigan. Aquila Resources Inc. (TSX: AQA) ("Aquila"), a Canadian development stage company, is actively seeking the necessary approvals to mine and process gold, zinc, copper, silver and other minerals at the site.

To date the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) has approved two of the four required permits for the project. The Nonferrous Metallic Mineral Mining Permit and the Michigan Air Use Permit to Install for the project were approved by the MDEQ on December 28, 2016. The National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permit and the permit for wetland impacts are currently under consideration before the MDEQ.

The Menominee Nation and many allies including local citizens, local governments, environmental organizations, and grassroots organizations are opposed to the mine, committed to stopping the project and are organized in efforts to bring about public awareness about the harmful impacts the mining operation would have if approved.

Aquila's Back Forty "open pit

mine" would be constructed ~150 feet from the Menominee River. Because this is a METALLIC SULFIDE MINE, the mine's proximity raises serious flooding and inundation risks.

The Menominee Tribe's history is unique because their origin or creation begins at the mouth of the Menominee River, a mere 60 miles east of their present Menominee Indian Reservation. The Menominee River is where our history begins and the Menominee River, including the Sixty Islands Area near the proposed Back Forty Mine, are central to Menominee's history and culture.

Because the Back Forty would be a sulfide mine, it threatens to leach sulfuric acid, which is extremely hazardous to freshwater rivers, lakes, streams and groundwater. Again, the Center for Science in Public Participation warns that the mine's "ARD (Acid Rock Drainage) risk is very high. Most tailings are expected to generate acid, with the exception of tailings produced in year three of mining. Additionally, over 75% of the waste rock is expected to generate acid." Sulfide mining could pollute groundwater or devastate the Menominee River, which drains into Lake Michigan.

In recognition of Earth Day, the Menominee Indian Tribe of Wisconsin applauded American Rivers, a Washington, D.C.-based conservation group, for naming the Menominee River to its 2017 America's Most Endangered Rivers List. Each year, the organization names the Top 10 endangered rivers to its list. American Rivers named the river to the endangered list because of the proposed Back Forty Mine

"The Menominee Tribe views the proposed project as a dangerous and irresponsible threat to our cultural resources and the Menominee River ecosystem. The Tribe applauds American Rivers for bringing the endangerment of the Menominee River to the forefront nationally," stated Menominee Tribal Chairman Gary Besaw.

The 120-mile long river separates northeastern Wisconsin and Michigan's Upper Peninsula and is one of the largest watersheds in the Great Lakes drainage basin. The Menominee River drains into the Green Bay of Lake Michigan at Marinette, Wisconsin / Menominee, Michigan.

The Midwest Alliance of Sovereign Tribes (MAST), an intertribal organization representing the 33 federally recognized tribes and 4 intertribal organizations in the

States of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Indiana and Iowa, unanimously passed a resolution opposing the proposed Back Forty Mine. Through the MAST impact week in Washington DC, over 50 congressional offices, 3 federal agencies, the National Congress of American Indians and many others were briefed on the dangers of the proposed Back Forty Mine.

The Menominee Tribe seeks to halt the final permit needed for Aquila to begin operations. The company has already received three of four permits from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality's (MDEQ). The Stockbridge-Munsee Community has stood with the Menominee Nation in opposition of the mine.



"It's the fact that we are the largest employer in the county," she said. "It speaks volumes to our investment, not only in our county, but the commitment to our community. I think that's what it really is because at the end of the day it is a casino, but it's so much more than that to us. It's about partnership and community building and that's really reflective of what the Stockbridge-Munsee Tribe does respectively in our community and as a whole."

Not only does North Star Casino employ close to 500 staff members, the revenue received by Stockbridge-Munsee goes back into the community locally, like assisting with educating members and providing healthcare. They also assist Shawano County directly in offsetting their budget, or by providing officers at-large because the agencies are cross-deputized.

North Star hopes to be able to replicate the success they've sustained thus far and they believe it's a simple recipe for success: ensuring their customers have a great time.

"That's just really part of our vision currently, to be the premier destination casino resort in Wisconsin," said North Star General Manager Michael Bonakdar. "We want to be number one. We want to make sure our customers feel number one when they join us here. Our overall mission is to provide friendlier service. It can't get simpler than that."

Becoming number one doesn't come without its challenges. One lies just 17 miles away, after it was announced the Ho-Chunk Casino near Wittenberg would expand at their location.

The Stockbridge contends that the expansion is not what the Wittenberg facility is licensed for, and if the larger casino is allowed

to open, it could put a crimp into the business generated at their casino in Bowler.

The tribe filed a federal lawsuit against the state of Wisconsin in April for not protecting their interests and rights. They've also threatened to withhold payment of \$923,000 to the state because of the dispute.

Regardless of what happens, however, Holsey assures they'll make every effort to be the best casino in the area for their customers.

"We're going to always strive to be that casino of choice through excellence, great customer service and all the things we need to do because customers have choices," she explained. "We want to be that casino of choice, so we're going to continue to improve our amenities, improve the service and quality of food and entertainment that we provide for our guests. We're going to continue to do that regardless of what happens [with the lawsuit]."

29th. The group also marched in the Gresham Memorial Day Parade and held their annual Brick Memorial Ceremony at the Mohican Veterans Memorial wall on County Highway A. They invited the drum group Giitaase Singers and Gordon Williams and his group happily honored the request.

Robert Little, Commander of the Mohican Veterans, welcomed everyone in attendance to the Ceremony and the sixteenth dedication of the Stockbridge-Munsee Community Veterans Memorial.

Giitaase Singers played an Honor Song to begin this Memorial Day ceremony. Commander Little gave an opening prayer and invited Tribal Council President: Shannon Holsey to give a statement about the day and what our veterans have done for this Tribe and this Country.

Little spoke at length about Memorial Day, "We pay tribute and salute to all those men and women who wore the uniform of the United States of America's Military who have fallen and given the ultimate sacrifice in every conflict from the Revolutionary War all the way up to the current war on Terror."

Little said we further honor those who are serving and again ask the Great Spirit to protect and return these soldiers to their families. "Let us not forget the Veterans who have fallen in this present war. The Mohican Veterans have remembered by flying the Flags at half-staff on the day of their funeral. This year John Welk and Took Moede installed the new Memorial Bricks and the Vets wanted to give their thanks again to the Stockbridge-Munsee Community and Tribal Council for contributing to the Memorial; be it money or their time and especially their effort.

Seven (7) more Memorial Bricks were added to the memorial this year. Little said, "We have the past and present veterans on this Memorial Wall, all the way back to our Warrior Ancestors and forward to the present. A total of 345 Memorial Bricks with 355 veterans total. We now will be reading off the last seven (7) names with a drum beat after each one to honor them. We would like the families of each one to stand as we recognize each veteran. Mohican Veterans Officers can you read off the names: Vice Commander Jeff Heubel, Financial Officer and Adjutant Brandi Dove, Sgt. At Arms Larry Hill, Chaplain William B. Doxtator, Commander Robert Little.

At this time during the ceremony Giitaase Singers sang a Veterans Song and the Veterans in attendance did an about face and saluted the Wall of Veterans.

Commander Little ended the event saying, "The flags were lowered to Half-Staff on this day "Memorial Day" to remember and honor the brave men and women of America's Armed Forces who, throughout our Nation's history, have laid down their lives in defense of the United States of America. Now we will bring the veterans to attention (hand salute) and raise flags to full staff."

Taps were played by John Groat. And the Mohican Veterans invited everyone to come forward and view the Memorial Bricks and honor their loved ones. The Mohican Veterans then invited everyone to the Mohican Veterans Memorial Lodge for a meal. The event ended appropriately with a Traveling Song by Giitaase Singers.

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

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
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
